Catching up with... Barbara O'Grady

Many OADG members remember Barbara O'Grady and her horse, Kanada Post, competing up to Intermédiare I a few years back. Mrs. O'Grady has remained a member of OADG, and we asked her recently if she would summarize her competitive career and the highlights along the way.

Thank you for your interest. So many memories, so much fun!

Kanada Post was my "horse of a lifetime". He was born two weeks early, hence the name. His main career was eventing – he won every event he entered at each level, including the Ontario Championships in 1997. Many thanks to dressage coach Gina Smith and cross-country coach Betty Cooper.

Kanada Post was 7/8th Thoroughbred and 1/8th Hannoverian, perfect for eventing, galloping and jumping BUT quite a challenge for dressage! After his eventing career, it was thanks to Gina's patient coaching that helped us climb the ladder of dressage. Many challenges were presented as we worked our way up the rungs to Prix St Georges and Intermédiare I, but so much fun to reach each new progression as neither horse nor rider were dressage protégés from birth!

I have had numerous horses in my 72 years of riding. We are still breeding, raising and racing Thoroughbreds at Woodbine in Toronto. I am still riding, but not competing, thus selling all of that equipment.*

I have probably been a member of OADG for forty years. It has been an important way to bring along young horses, enjoy clinics, and spend time with friends. A membership with OADG gives young riders many varied opportunities to understand the importance of dressage and have fun while learning. It is important to continue to support OADG in order to cheer on and support those continuing to improve and enjoy their riding.

An important note to young riders: your dressage has to be a good solid base for everything else.

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Organizing a Dressage Show

Changes to the Ottawa-area dressage show venues

Change comes to all things – I think that's a quote but I can't remember where from! Over the past couple of seasons, Ottawa riders have seen some new venues added to the circuit of dressage shows, both here in Ottawa and in the Kingston region. And next season (2015), Ottawa will lose one of our most stalwart venues – there will be no dressage shows held at Spiritwood Farm in 2015.

While we are sad to know that circumstances preclude Spiritwood from holding shows next year, the OADG would like to say a heartfelt "thank you" to Joanna and her staff of workers and volunteers. Spiritwood has been a long-term fixture on the local dressage circuit and we will miss it.

Centaur Riding School, Dewmont Farms, Heroncrest, Starlit Farm and Preston Rosedale have provided show facilities for a number of years, and most, if not all, are planning to continue offering their Gold, Silver and ESD shows. A big "thank you" to the facility owners and their teams of workers and volunteers for providing the opportunities to Ottawa dressage riders to show and train.

Recently, other facility owners/managers have stepped up to the plate and provided new show venues for ESD ("schooling") level shows, Silver, Gold and Platinum. In just a few years, Rainbow Ridge has held numerous shows, including a championship; Numech has hosted shows for the past two years; Oakhurst Farm has hosted the Silver championship and some ESD shows, and is joining the Silver circuit in 2015; and the Ottawa Dressage Festival Platinum ("FEI-level") show will be returning to Wesley Clover Parks in 2015. In addition, Mountain Star Stables will be hosting one Silver show and two ESD shows in 2015; SkyLine Farm will be offering an ESD show; and Graystone Equestrian Centre will be organizing a Silver show.

Your OADG Board of Directors encourages anyone who would like to try running an ESD, Silver, Gold or Platinum dressage show. We would welcome you to the Ottawa-area circuit of shows, and work with you to find the best match for a date within the schedule, to give advice on scheduling and footing, and to promote and facilitate cooperation and knowledge-sharing among the competition organizers. For 2015, we have sufficient shows on the schedule, but we're happy to hear from anyone who would like to plan for 2016.

Organizing a dressage competition

Your OADG Board would, seriously, NOT advise trying to run a Gold or Platinum show for your first event! More importantly, Equine Canada is extremely unlikely to sanction a Gold or Platinum show for a brand-new competition organizer at a brand-new facility! However, a few ESD and Silver shows provide a "track record" for an organizer who would like to build up to running a Gold or Platinum show.

Here is a list of some of the resources that are available to you as an organizer:

1. The rule books.

Read the rules! Good golly gosh, that sounds like something the judges and stewards all say, about competing! © True – and there is also a lot of information in the rule books about the requirements for putting on a dressage show. Everything from ring dimensions and minimum space around the ring (free from spectators), to drug testing requirements, to which officials you need to hire is available in the rule books.

Recommended reading: both Section A, General Regulations and Section E, Dressage. If you read them now, make sure you re-read them in the spring, to check if any changes have been made for the 2015 show season.

2. If this is your first show ever, ask an experienced competition organizer to work with you. You can use your own network of contacts, or your OADG Show Coordinator is happy to assist in suggesting people who might be able and willing to mentor you through your first show.



3. OADG Show Coordinator.

Anne Galt is available for advice, assistance with picking a date, and for answering questions. If she doesn't know the answer to your question, she probably knows who does!

4. OADG Show Organizers meeting.

All show organizers are invited to the Show Organizers meeting. Held in July, this meeting is used to set the show dates for the next season, and also allows the organizers to talk to each other and share advice.

5. Equine Canada website (for Platinum and Gold shows, and for Silver or Bronze shows running concurrently with a Gold show).

The Equine Canada website (http://equinecanada.ca) has a treasure trove of documents relating to applying for and organizing a show sanctioned by Equine Canada:

- the Competitions Information Package
- EC Guidelines to Complete my Application Form
- the Competition Application Forms themselves (there are different forms for Ontario and Québec):
 - o Ontario
 - o Ouébec
- a list of all of the competition forms (from Accident and Injury Report Form through to Yellow Warning Card!); recommended reading: Competition Manager Report, Competition Master Report Form, Dressage Steward Report & Evaluation Form and Horse Show/Event Certification of Insurance could all give you ideas for proactively planning your competition
- the Competition Administration Policy (CAP)
- additional information on the EC website:
 - i. a list of accredited officials (judges and dressage stewards; note that your stewards must be accredited in dressage)
 - ii. the back issues of the newsletters for competition managers, secretaries and officials might be interesting
 - iii. 2014 Letter to Competition Organizers & Officials (check in 2015 to see if there is an updated one)
 - iv. July 2013 Memorandum to EC Competition Organizers Regarding GABA and Injectable Magnesium
 - v. check the EC website periodically for new information

6. Ontario Equestrian Federation (OEF) website (for ESD, Bronze and Silver shows).

The OEF website (http://horse.on.ca) contains lots of great information for organizers of ESD, Bronze and Silver shows, including information about which officials you may hire, the deadlines for paperwork, and contact information

The Equestrian Skills Development webpage (http://horse.on.ca/competitions/organizers/equestrian-skills-development/) includes:

- the E.S.D. Sanctioning Guidelines and Requirements
- the E.S.D. Competition Application Form
- a Horse Show Insurance Certificate

OEF's webpage titled "Equine Canada Competitions" includes links to the Equine Canada forms and policies listed on the EC website (http://horse.on.ca/competitions/organizers/equine-canada-bronze-silver/). These pages also include information about which officials you may hire (different levels for each different level of show!), a list of accredited officials, the deadlines for paperwork, and contact information for Angelique

Homan (a.homan@horse.on.ca or 1-877-441-7112 ext 15) who can answer questions about organizing the shows.

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7. Consider the viewpoint of the competitors.

If you are currently a competitor, or you used to compete, or you can ask competitors at your barn, put on your "competitive helmet" for a while – think about what you liked at a show, and what you didn't like at a show. If you can put yourself in the place of your competitors, you'll be able to proactively plan to provide the type of show that competitors will like. Their results, of course, are up to them – but if they can leave the show grounds at the end of the day saying "wow! That venue did a good job of providing a nice location. The warm-up ring was accessible and safe, the lunch truck was convenient, the trailer parking was straightforward and it was easy to get the trailer out at the end of the day", then that competitor will probably decide to come back next year.

Some general comments:

- Prize list approval For Silver and Gold shows, don't forget that your prize list must receive approval from your steward, well in advance of the show! It must be approved before you can post it or distribute it.
- If you are running an Ontario Silver or Bronze level of competition, even though these are classified as "Equine Canada" sanctioned shows you can sanction them through the OEF office.
- Silver or Bronze competitions that are running concurrently with a Gold competition must be sanctioned through the Equine Canada office.
- Platinum and Gold competitions are always sanctioned through the Equine Canada office.
- All shows except ESD are subject to drug testing. You must provide a suitable stall for the drug tester.
- If you have multiple warm-up areas, or your warm-up area is a long distance from your competition ring, you should consider engaging more than one steward. Learner stewards and Basic/Medium stewards appreciate the opportunity to work with your paid steward in order to gain the experience they require for upgrading. Talk to your steward early; they may know of someone who wants to gain experience.
- Although it's not stated in the rules, it is highly considerate of the organizer to provide a private area for the judge and steward to have lunch, so (if necessary) they can discuss any events that cropped up during the competition.

Volunteers:

You will need a few good (reliable) people to help at your show. Not all volunteers need to be knowledgeable about dressage or even about horses, but some of the positions do need someone with knowledge to fill them. They need to know that the position is "rain or shine, snow or hail"!

- You will need to provide a scribe for each judge. Ask early, as the good, experienced scribes are often booked early! The scribe sits next to the judge and writes down the marks and comments, so the judge never has to take their eyes off the competitor. This is a great position for someone who wants to learn more about what the judge is looking for, or for a recorded judge who would like to upgrade.
- Runners to pick up the tests from the judge's booth(s) and run them over to the scorers.
- Scorers to calculate the overall mark for each test, and to calculate the placings in each class and division (1st, 2nd, champion, reserve, etc.).
- A show secretary, to hand out the numbers and collect them at the end of the day, and to collect the passports and send them to the steward.
- A whipper-in, at least one but preferably one per ring. The whipper-in keeps the competitors aware of their upcoming times for tests, and ensures that all riders are aware if there is a delay in ride times.

Note that horse show activities can be used by high school students as part of their volunteer hours (required for graduation). Ask them to bring their form, and sign it for them to register the number of hours that they work.

If you are a competitor, after reading this – I'm sure you can see it's a lot of work to put on a horse show! Please remember to thank the show organizer and the facility owner for providing the venue. Almost always, the organizers say it's worth it, and they're happy to "give back" to the horse community.



Perspectives

The view from the judge's booth

Bravery: how to teach it, every day, every ride – and "why"

From my Madame Judge's point of view @ 'C', I witness a number of incidents of 'Loss of Bravery'.

In dressage it's referred to as a change of tempo, rhythm interrupted, hesitant, reluctant, misbehaviour, off track and so on.

In my personal riding and coaching this is addressed every day – in arenas, rings and hacking. I start small and build as my mount's bravery increases.

Looking for puddles, odd footing, fallen logs, changes in ground texture, light-to-shadow and back again are high on my mind. Where to guide my horse's hooves and body while maintaining straightness with a supple response, following 'my line', not theirs, is a daily goal of being a rider – not a passenger – a trainer or guide if you will.

In this manner my horse learns to trust my call. I become the leader and they are content and willing to follow my aids.

Never do I let them get into trouble, nor do I approach these 'oddities' with tension. Lightly releasing the rein pressure, but not dropping the feel completely encourages 'GO' and I praise with my voice. All the while keeping my body and rein aids firm, comforting and progressive on the forward direction. If my mount is clearly hesitant, I double my image of 'getting through' in my mind and body. Disallow step back, then praise; disallow stepping out left or right, then praise; only allow forward and praise, big time! Using a good sense of expectation of success coupled with awareness of my mount's willingness, I find a level of accomplishment as to be able to reward, never reprimand. And we come back to this specific situation again another day until we pass it to my feel of correct confidence and harmony.

Should this come up in a dressage ring, on an unappealing weather day (with wind, rain, puddles, soggy flowers or footing), we will be brave enough to show our partnership off in a positive manner.

You cannot always control what happens, so prepare at home, often, so you both will be ready to bravely handle it, and show off, not fall off!

It feels better than good to win, it feels right!

Equine massage therapy – Post competition

The competitive show season is wrapping up for many and as we take a look back at our accomplishments and set new goals for the next show season, we shouldn't forget about the high physical demands that were placed on our horses throughout the show season.

Dressage horses are trained to perform with sophistication and finesse of execution which requires them to demonstrate control, flexibility, and accuracy. The nature of dressage work requires your horse to have great muscle control and coordination and over the course of a show season, muscles in the horse's body are inevitably stressed and fatigued. Some common signs of muscle tension are:

- limited range of motion
- lacks forward impulsion
- refusal to take a lead
- horse hollows back
- rhythm feels 'off'

- throws up head for gait changes
- inability to round their back

An equine massage therapist will perform an overall assessment and if working on a dressage horse, they will likely pay particular attention to the hindquarters, lower back, shoulders, neck (upper and lower), and jaw. The aim of the massage is to relieve tension, help restore balance, range of motion, and relaxation.

A post competition equine massage will undoubtedly help relieve immediate tension and coupled with regular wellness treatments it will help keep your horse's muscles healthy and balanced, maintain strength and suppleness, and enhance range of movement for optimal performance.

Taking good care of your horse's body and mind will help you and your horse perform at their best both at home and in the ring.

(Note: Equine Massage Therapy should not be considered as a substitute for veterinary care.)

does need to eat! I also took along some water from the farm's well, because sometimes horses won't drink strange-smelling water (from a different well). I also took along lots of carrots, as either rewards or bribes!

When we arrived at the other facility, there were things that my horse had not seen – such as strange dogs, horses that she didn't know, a tractor with a different engine sound, and a flappy flag waving in the breeze. I think my horse gave all of these scary things the same label – dragons! There were also children riding ponies – aka "elves" and "dwarves"!

I tacked up with plenty of time for a relaxed warm-up, so we walked around the property a little bit. About 20 minutes before my scheduled time, I started warming my horse up in the sand ring. We did our normal walk/trot warm-up, avoiding some of the "dragons" but going close to most of them. The clinician asked us to do most of the same stuff as we do at home – baby-green horse, so we're only doing walk/trot movements at the moment. She gave me lots of feedback on how to improve my position, and how to ensure my horse is doing the movements correctly.

My mare did fabulously well for a baby-green going to a new facility and doing her first-ever dressage clinic. I was very pleased with what I learned from the clinician, and how well my mare behaved! When we got back to the barn, I put her in the borrowed stall, gave her some hay and carrots, made sure she had water, and headed back to the sand ring to watch a couple of other riders.

Eventually, it was time to load my mare back into the trailer and go home. Well, she didn't like the idea – until I put some carrots at the front of the trailer and then she simply walked up the ramp and my friend could put the butt-bar up behind her! When we got back to the farm where I stable her, she unloaded like a "pro", went into her stall, and proceeded to tell her herd-mates all about it!

By the way, the facility that hosted the clinic is NOT a "funny farm"! ©
